

MILLION DOLLAR POKER TOURNAMENT

CHIPS VALUES

White chips: \$10,000

Each player receives 10 (\$100,000)

Red chips: \$50,000

Each player receives 8 (\$400,000)

Blue chips: \$100,000

Each player receives 5 (\$500,000)

WHAT ARE BLINDS?

Million Dollar Poker will be played with BLINDS, which are forced bets posted by players to the left of the dealer. As blinds increase players need to increase chip count to stay in the game.

Example: If each player in a tournament starts with 1,000,000 in chips and the first blind will start with \$10,000 and 2nd blind is \$20,000, which is mandatory betting (called the pot). Blinds will increase in intervals of 15 minutes. By increasing bets every 15 minutes, players will be eliminated with the loss of their chips. By doing this, it also will be very difficult for a player with only 15,000 in chips to stay in the game. Players will be eliminated by the loss of chips.

HOW TO PLAY:

Texas Hold 'em is a variation of the standard card game of poker. The dealer distributes two cards face down to each player and the first round of betting ensues. After all bets have been made, the dealer places 3 cards face up in front of him/herself as part of the community cards. These three cards are called the "FLOP" and players place another round of bets. The dealer adds one card face up to the "FLOP," called the "TURN" and again, a round of betting ensues. The dealer lays the final card face up in the community. This final card is referred to as the "RIVER," and this is when final betting occurs.

At each betting instance, players have the option to "CHECK" or "CALL" (no further betting, but still in), "BET" (increase the ante), or "FOLD" (opt out of the current poker hand).

The game is divided into a series of hands or deals; at the conclusion of each hand, the pot is typically awarded to one player. A hand may end at the "SHOWDOWN" in which case the remaining players compare their hands and the highest hand is awarded the pot.
